FOX sceptic Ivan Dean has launched another investigation into what he alleges was a futile multi-million dollar program to eradicate the red pest.

The Legislative Councillor claims he has proof a "very critical piece of evidence" used to justify the Fox Eradication Program was falsified.

It follows a report on 7.30 on the ABC last night that cast further doubt over the physical evidence collected by the Fox Taskforce that ran from 2001-14.

In 2009 former Parks, Water and Environment Department scientist Simon Fearn produced a report showing five purported fox scats, used as evidence by the Taskforce, were in fact from other

animals.
In 2011 he wrote another report, leaked to 730, which was reportedly more critical of the

evidence.
"Sufficient evidence exists to suspect that some hoaxing has occurred via mainland fox scats being placed in the land-scape," he is said to have writ-

The program said the report found 26 of the 57 scats were possible hoaxes and another ll were most likely from other animals.

The eradication program, which received tens of millions of dollars from state and commonwealth governments, is one of Tasmania's most controversial public policies

troversial public policies.

It was prosecuted on a basis
Tasmania had to do everything
possible to prevent a fox invasion and the ecological dis-

aster that would follow.

But the failure to capture or record a single live fox led to

deep scepticism and from there allegations of fraud. Intensifying the controversy was the discovery a fox carcass found on a remote highway in the North last month was a hoax.

A joint department and police investigation found it

was brought in from Victoria.

A man has been interviewed but the department is refusing to say whether he has been charged. It said the man was not a former Taskforce member.

Last month a police review of documents submitted by Mr Dean alleging fox evidence was doctored found no cri nal offences by the taskforce its members.

But Mr Dean said he wo continue to investigate program and has handed o his latest information to

Integrity Commission.

"It's very good informat and it clearly has to be right cause he was able to tell things about the evidence twe couldn't get an answer februsial.

Deputy Premier Jere Rockliff said the departm was reviewing the police rep into Mr Dean's allegations.
