Expert probes foxes in state

THE co-author of a scentific paper that claimed foxes were widespread in Tammaia in doing new research in the orea.

Stephen Sarre yesterday declined to comment on calls for his 2012 "Fixes are now widespread in Tasmanta" paper to be ressessed by the scientific journal it was published in.

Denison MP Androw Wilkie has written to the Journal Of Applied Ecology miking it to consides whether recent allogations of boox fox evidence in Tammania "have any bearing upon the west of the cinciution reached" by the peer-reviewed paper.

It follows reports on ABC TVA 730 that enologist Simon Fearth raised doobts about the evalence used by the state's Fox Eradication Program to claim the existence of the pest in Taxmunta.

"Sufficient evidence exists to suspect that more hosting has occurred var maintaind for scate being placed in the landscape." Mr Finan wrote in his JOH report for the Department of Primary Industries. Parks, Water and Environment.

Mr. Fearn's unreleased seport claimed 26 of the 37 feascats were possible houses and another 31 were most likely free other animals.

"I am currently involved in a research project aimed at an analysis of fix-positive scats and will report on that when it is appropriate to do so."

Mr Wilkie said the journal was considering his request.

He said he had long-held executes about the Fox Eradication Program, which cost taxpayers tens of millions of dulars from 2004 to 2014.

No live fox was ever caught or captured on film.

Tanmania Police recently found Mr Dean's allegations of fox evidence tampering did not point to criminal wrongdoon;

It referred the matter to DPDWE to investigate any breaches of the State Service Act.
