


# Scientist tells of hoax scat samples



Sufficient evidence exists to suspect that some hoaxing has occurred

FOX sceptic Ivan Dean has launched another investigation into what he alleges was a futile multi-million dollar program to eradicate the red pest.

The Legislative Councillor claims he has proof a "very critical piece of evidence" used to justify the Fox Eradication Program was falsified.

It follows a report on 7.30 on the ABC last night that cast further doubt over the physical evidence collected by the Fox Taskforce that ran from 2008-14.

In 2009 former Parks Water and Environment Department scientist Simon Fearn produced a report showing five purported fox scats used as evidence by the Taskforce were in fact from other animals.

In 2013 he wrote another report, leaked to 7.30, which was reportedly more critical of the evidence.

"Sufficient evidence exists to suspect that some hoaxing has occurred via mainland fox scats being placed in the landscape," he is said to have written.

The program said the report found 26 of the 37 scats were possible hoaxes and another 11 were most likely from other animals.

The eradication program, which received tens of millions of dollars from state and commonwealth governments, is one of Tasmania's most controversial public policies.

It was prosecuted on a basis Tasmania had to do everything possible to prevent a fox invasion and the ecological disaster that would follow.

But the failure to capture or record a single live fox led to

deep scepticism and from there allegations of fraud. Intensifying the controversy was the discovery a fox carcass found on a remote highway in the North last month was a hoax.

A joint department and police investigation found it was brought in from Victoria.

A man has been interviewed but the department is refusing to say whether he has been charged. It said the man was not a former Taskforce member.

Last month a police review of documents submitted by Mr Dean alleging fox evidence

was doctored found no criminal offence by the Taskforce or its members.

But Mr Dean said he would continue to investigate the program and has handed over his latest information to the Integrity Commission.

"It's very good information and it clearly has to be right because he was able to tell us things about the evidence that we couldn't get an answer for," he said.

Deputy Premier Jeremy Rockliff said the department was reviewing the police report with Mr Dean's allegations.
